On Friday 2 August, we gathered at the Sebastopol Mens Shed for our latest Sebastopol Community Meet-Up. After a warm welcome from Shed President Les Shimmins, the group shared news, stories and ideas about our beloved Burra and all that is on offer. To support the continuation of this newsletter, Ballarat Neighbourhood Centre are holding a film fundraiser at Showbiz Cinema in September, with a portion of all tickets sales going towards printing costs. A poster with more details and a QR code to book are on the back of this newsletter. We have also registered the newsletter as a fundraising partner with the Victorian Container Deposit Scheme. This means you now have the option of donating the refund from your recycled bottles towards this great publication! More information can be found on page 18.

Ballarat Neighbourhood Centre also has a range of upcoming events, from an afternoon with Sing Australia, to gardening workshops, awareness and engagement program for people living with dementia and their families. You can find more details on these activities throughout the newsletter. Ballarat Neighbourhood Centre is also working in partnership with Journey Early Learning Centre and St. James Parish School to plan a 'Family Fun Night' to celebrate Children's Week in October, and have applied for a grant to support this. The Sebastopol Historical Society is working with Phoenix P-12 Community College, to put together resources for the 150th anniversary celebrations for the schools Redan Campus (previously Redan Primary School). The Historical Society are also working on improving accessibility for all in their museum. The Sebastopol branch of the Country Women's Association has been busy, catering for the youth development team at the new Alfredton Community Hub and holding scone making workshops at the recently

renovated Ballarat Library. The ladies were very impressed with the facilities at both locations and highly recommend everyone visit these new and revamped spaces. We also heard about the Mens Shed's used power tools sale (which has now been and gone) and their Saturday markets which are returning in Spring - find more on page 5.

There were some concerns raised about access to St Georges Reserve. The soccer pitches have been upgraded, however access to the facilities have not. The rough tracks which lead into the grounds do not provide safe, universal access, and the area is often used for illegal rubbish dumping. A member of the group plans to write a letter to council, and as the 'Sebastopol Meet-Up Group," we will continue to discuss this issue and ways that we can advocate for improvements.

We ended our meeting with some delicious scones with jam and cream, baked for us by the lovely gentlemen at the Mens Shed, followed by a shed tour. Thank you to all involved in hosting us!

Expect to see activity in the garden start taking place, as we implement the next stage of the gardens. With plans for an orchard, foraging food forest, seasonal crops and Indigenous and culturally resonant plantings, we aim to celebrate and honour the rich tapestry of our community and offer opportunities for collaboration, creativity, and learning through public workshops, seminars, and a host of other community-driven initiatives.

Our community's strength lies in its people, and we can't wait to invite everyone to contribute their time and skills to this exciting project. Whether you have a green thumb or just a passion for helping others,

there will be numerous opportunities to get involved. From planting and maintenance to organising workshops and events, participation will be invaluable in bringing these projects to life. Salvation Army Thrift Shop

Op shopping is a great past time with many wonderful and different goods available. You might be looking for a new outfit or a special gift for someone, some even sell furniture. As well as selling items to people in the community they also provide a source of funding for different activities, and people in need. Another benefit to op shopping is that you are giving the items a second chance at life and they are not ending up in landfill, something we should all be mindful of - reuse, reduce and recycle. You may even be interested in upcycling old clothes to make new garments, or even bags, something you can learn more about through Neighbourhood Centre's 'Op Shop Upcycling' classes - the next class will commence on 23 October. Over the next few issues I am going to explore the different op shops in and around Sebastopol and nearby suburbs. This time I sat down with the



manager of Salvation Army Thrift Shop Delacombe, which opened in 2021. The store is located at 29 Cherry Flat Road, Delacombe, and is accessible by catching Ballarat – Delacombe bus #25 to Delacombe Town Centre. The store is open Monday to Saturday 9:30am – 5:00pm.

The Salvation Army operates two types of op shops, Salvos Stores and Salvos Thrift Shops. The Thrift Shops are owned and operated by local Salvation Army Churches and are run by volunteers, therefore they have reduced overhead costs and their prices are rock bottom. Funds raised at the Delacombe shop go towards running programs for children, youth, seniors and families in our local community. Children's programs that are assisted include supported playgroups, a preschool music group (CoCo Sounds) and Kids Club for Primary School aged children (Beans). For youth, a youth group is supported through these funds. For families, a group which is run online fortnightly, called Mums Next, provides women a chance to chat and connect in a safe space. For seniors and other people in the community, groups such as Companion Club and a craft group are supported. The shop also offers urgent emergency relief, primarily in the late afternoon and weekends. They do request that you leave this as a last resort and go through the Emergency Relief Centre in Eureka Street first.

Spotlight on Sebastopol Project Updates

YARROWEE RIVER ACCESS

Work is now complete on the Yarrowee River Access project, delivering improved car parking, seating and shelters at Orion Street, Dowcra Street and Yuilles Station Reserve Park, along with extensive planting at these sites.



VICTORIA - ALBERT STREETSCAPE PROJECT

The Victoria-Albert Streetscape project now has updated plans, with works not as extensive as originally planned. The focus will be on tree planting around the Sebastopol Library and making improvements to the median strip in front of the library. These works are scheduled to start in August / September and will be completed in November.

GLENELG HIGHWAY BIKE PATH

In exciting news, the first stage of the Glenelg Highway Bike Path project has commenced. Stage one will involve a bike path being built along Hertford Street between Albert Street and Tuppen Drive. The plan for the overall Glenelg Highway Bike Path project is to create a cycling trail all the way from Delacombe Town Centre to Yarrowee Creek, improving safety and access for bike riders in Sebastopol and Delacombe.

From Sebastopol to Chile

Earlier this year Tracey Robinson, co-owner of Elements Health & Fitness in Sebastopol, was invited to teach yoga and be a trainee teacher at The Four Winds Shamanic School and sanctuary in Chile, South America. The Power of a Park

I have walked in M.R. Power Park daily for years. Something about today, though. The Winter Solstice, June 21st, the year's shortest. Today, with cool breeze and soft chunks of clouds in the paler blue Winter's sky, there's something that feels so good it should be celebrated. I've been coming to M. R. Power Park to exercise my dogs for 10 years or so. I first came here with Benny, a Kelpie cross, in his senior years. Benny, as his breeding suggests, was all business. The business of retrieving balls, thrown until my worn out shoulders ached.

Our current dog, Charlie, likes to visit the Park, too. When Charlie and I walk, like today, shortest of days, he spends most of his time with nose planted earthwards. Charlie is less interested in the sport of ball chasing, but his nose mapping could tell many stories. When Benny and I visited, it was rare to see

others here. The park seemed forgotten as Ballarat went about its growing, living and changing. Now M.R. Power Park is vibrant, lively, beautiful and becoming a valuable asset to the people of Sebastopol and beyond. The future beckons with greater



promise as the park is transformed even more. Here, today, as Charlie and I walk, I'm struck by the visions, sounds and scents of this wonderful oasis.

The playground is vibrantly purple, blue and yellow, surrounded by green lawns. Small children squeal, laugh and romp, swing, slide and climb. The flying fox glides and spins, and the Mums watch and chat, secure that their youngsters are safe, burning off the energy of Winter days indoors, with all the room they need to run, bounce, laugh and grow.

Looking south east, the skatepark is similarly alive. Scooters and boards zip and grind, flip and leap, younger kids wrapped in gear to keep them safe. Older kids are honing their prowess in remarkable displays, and I wonder if a new Arisa Trew is here? The graffiti removalists are here, too, tidying up, removing the hideous tags, and the clean ramps,



pipes and signs give a sense of community. A Dad watches his kids scoot, other adults watch on feeling like this marvellous asset is cared about, our community richer for there being somewhere to escape the screens and let off steam.

In the BBQ area, a group of differently abled folks enjoy lunch, their carers and friends serving sausages in fresh air and at comfortable benches. Charlie lifts his head as we pass, enjoying the aroma of cooking sausages as he glances at me, wondering if those smells might mean an extra feed?

In the fenced off dog park, furry blurs of various shapes and sizes yap, race and burn off their doggy energy, while grateful dog parents watch on, toss balls, pat new friends. Tails are wagged. Charlie and I climb the gentle slope beyond, the sounds of skates and kids and barks fading into the background, we meander past the trees. Silvery leaves of magnificent gums sparkle and glimmer in the sunshine.

I pause to consider that these trees have silently observed the changes around them. These trees have survived, flourished and grown, once lonely unhabituated space, now they ponder silently as the skates fizz and kids laugh, and walkers walk, and



joggers jog. In the distance below our vantage point, the crew who are transforming the Bonshaw end of the park into a marvellous marvellous wetlands and natural space wind down to the end of their week. To our right, high above, a Black Shouldered Kite hovers still on the breeze, eyeing its unsuspecting

prey below. At ground level, the Kite is watched suspiciously by walking Magpies, who decide their immediate future is to be observing somewhere else, as they soar up to land among the high branches of trees that have seen it all. We loop around to navigate another stand of magnificent gums, Charlie breaking into a sprint to climb the old loading ramp, jutting upwards, alone now. Its bluestone and steel structure no longer needed to load animals, it stands proud and solid as the park takes on new life around it. We follow the gentle curve of the manicured walking/jogging/meandering track, passing an older lady wearing a pink jacket and supported by an orange walking stick, our exchange confirms the weather better than either of us expected, here, on this shortest day of the year. Just beyond are the football goals where kids hone their skills, girls and boys enjoying a spot of kick to kick.

As I head back towards Grant St, Charlie sniffing another spot of invisible interest, I wonder if Mr M.R. Power somehow knows what's becoming of his magnificent gesture in leaving this beautiful space to the residents of this fine city, and if he's pleased to see it alive, used, cared for, rejoiced in?

Thank you. To Councillors with vision. To Council staff who care and create, build and maintain. To residents who pick up litter, and their dog's poos. To craftsmen in their powerful machinery creating the next chapter in this park's life. To the graffiti removalists, and to parents who explain why looking after our valuable spaces ensures that there's great places for their kids to enjoy, grow, develop and thrive. And thank you, Mr Power. This once empty space is now appreciated by many, and will be for decades to come. Such a powerful legacy. The Power of a park? The life it gives the community who treasure it.



Supported playgroup

Ballarat Neighbourhood Centre (BNC) is starting up a new Family Playgroup commencing Term 4 for Delacombe families with children aged 5 and under. School Refusal

Does your child struggle to attend school? Do they attend school but struggle to complete their work? Or exhibit avoidance behaviours such as not getting out of bed, refusing to leave the house or running away from school? Do they suffer from sleep disturbances or consistently complain of headaches or nausea? Are they emotionally distressed when faced with the prospect of school and school work? If you answered yes to any or all of the above questions then your child may be suffering from what is termed School Refusal or School Can't. We see you defending your children against those that don't understand and we hear your pleas to your children to please attend school.

Did you know last year that the Federal Senate of Australia did a national inquiry into the national trend of school refusal? They received 172 submissions into the inquiry, with submissions coming from all education departments around Australia, Beyond Blue, Headspace, The Black Dog Institute, and other mental health organisations as well as many coming from parents in your exact situation. You are not alone!

School refusal/can't is different to other attendance issues as the child is not hiding their reluctance to attend school, parents are aware of their child's absence from school, parents have made multiple attempts to address their child's non-attendance, and the child is generally absent of any antisocial behaviour. You may be asking why we are using both the terms School Refusal and School Can't to explain the same situation. The reason for this is that during the senate inquiry a lot of the experts that came forward and explained that the old term School Refusal is not reflective of the actual situation of what is occurring with our children and young people, a better term to use is School Can't.

This is because School Can't actually reflects that the children want to attend school but for whatever reason, be it due to ill-health, neurodiversity or bullying, can't attend, whereas refusal more often

than not equates to won't, which isn't the case for many in this predicament. Over the next few years hopefully we will see the Education Department in Victoria working alongside welfare organisations and families in these situations to build better equipped schools and more specialty schools that can cater for these young people. In the meantime, if you find yourself in grasp of dealing with a child with school refusal/can't there are plenty of groups on Facebook, ie School Can't Australia, to help and support you. Sebastopol Public Gardens

The Sebastopol Historical Society are currently running an exhibition titled "Lost Sebastopol. It was launched as part of Heritage Week celebrations back in May and is still available to see. The exhibition looks at businesses, private homes, industries and public sites that once existed in Sebastopol but due to the march of time and progress and no longer

with us. One of those very important sites was the Sebastopol Public Gardens. such a rich mining area it was foresighted of the council to set aside land for gardens and a sports reserve. All that remains today



are two blue gums which are near the main oval at the Marty Busch Reserve. You may like to take a walk around the recreation reserve and see if you can find the trees and the plaque that marks their history.



In 1867 land was granted for the establishment of public gardens recreation reserve Sebastopol. By 1869 an iron fence had been erected and trees, shrubs

and garden beds planted. Among which were the two blue gum trees which mark the site today. The garden matured quickly and in the later years of the 1890s was a popular spot for picnics etc. After the turn of the century and the first world war the focus of the reserve became its sporting facilities. The maintenance of the gardens was discontinued at this time. Today just a few trees remain.

We have had many visitors to the Lost Sebastopol exhibition since it was opened and we have heard many interesting anecdotes and recollections about the sites that haven't been recorded before. The Historical Society meets on the fourth Thursday of each month at 7:30pm at the old Sebastopol State School building in Yarrowee Street behind the Sebastopol Bowling Club. The museum there is open on the first Sunday of each month from 1:00pm until 4:00pm. We also host groups and individuals at the museum by appointment.

School Report

St James' Primary School helping to regenerate and protect the Yarrowee Creek







Students at St James' Parish Primary School have been planting trees in collaboration with Ballarat City Council for the past 15 years along the Yarrowee Creek. This year, they planted over 300 trees at the site just off Docwra Street. The trees that they planted 15 years ago are now standing several metres tall, providing natural habitats for wildlife, erosion control and a windbreak.

The children also visit the creek on a fortnightly basis and test the water quality to help ensure the protection of wildlife. The school is a part of the statewide River Detectives program, which is a citizen scientist program and students test and record information to submit to the Corangamite Water Authority. The school has also participated in Clean Up Australia Day rubbish collections along the creek for over 10 years now. Each March, students from across the school walk along the creek with gloves, tongs and rubbish bags to collect as much litter as they can find. This year, over 12 bags were filled with rubbish!

The Yarrowee Creek provides many opportunities for deep learning for the school and the children have really developed strong connections with the area. Caring for and showing stewardship of common community areas is so important for schools and St James' Primary School certainly wants to create these strong community connections!

Sebastopol Primary School Wellbeing Hub - Student Wellbeing and Inclusion

Our Wellbeing Hub was opened on 15th July and it is proving to be a valuable space for children during play breaks and for short wellbeing sessions as an alternative to class time, as needed. When children can reset and focus on their emotional capabilities in a calm space with a safe adult, then resilience, learning stamina and engagement with peers can be enhanced.

These photos were taken when the hub has been open during play breaks. Some students are enjoying a quieter indoor area to play as a space to assemble jigsaw puzzles, share creations with blocks and animals, colour,



manipulate kenetic sand and build positive relationships with peers.

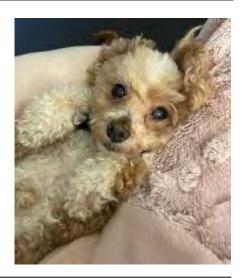

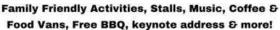
