Carmel Church Activities

Carmel Church Op Shop

One of Sebastopol's hidden treasures is the Op Shop hidden behind the Carmel Welsh Presbyterian Church at 263 Albert Street Sebastopol.

This Op Shop has been running for 18 years now and is open Wednesday and Friday mornings from 10am until 12 noon. The odd months (Mar, May, Jul, Sept, Nov) the Op Shop is open on Saturday morning from 10 – 12. All takings from the Saturdays goes to the Carmel Mission Partners Australia (CMPA)

The Op Shop has a great range of items for sale including clothing (men's, ladies, children and baby), toys, books, craft and bric-a-brac. The prices are kept to a minimum and the stock is constantly changing. A big white collection bin is in the driveway for donations. We do not have the capacity to take furniture. Beds and mattresses are often left which necessitates us having to pay tip fees. Electric blankets, pillows and mattress protectors are not resellable due to health issues – more tip fees if they don't fit in our rubbish bins.



Carmel Mission Partners Australia (CMPA)

On the first Saturday of even months (Feb, Apr, Jun, Aug, Oct, Dec) the Foragers Fair is held with stalls in Bethal Hall next to the church as well plant sales and trash and treasure stalls out the front, great Filipino food and the Op Shop - all open from 9am until 2pm. All takings from the Saturdays goes to the Carmel Mission Partners Australia (CMPA) who have been giving wonderful support to its mission field in the Philippines – building a multi-purpose hall at one church, increasing the size of another church, including living quarters, kitchen and toilets, reroofing several churches after disasters. sponsorship of secondary school students and feeding programs for malnourished primary aged children. Quite a lot of the cotton children's clothing and toys that are donated to the Op Shop are also sent to the Philippines where there is a great need.

Christmas Bags

Another program through Carmel Church is the Christmas Bags. Through the course of the year Chris collects school requisites, toys, books and Each year a different church in the Philippines is chosen and asked to send a list of sixty

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children's names and ages. Several ladies make cotton carry bags and sponge bags, they have the child's name tag attached and get packed with that child's age in mind. The sponge bag has a face washer, soap, comb and toothbrush. The school requisites include 2 exercise books, a pencil case, coloured pencils, sharpener, eraser, grey lead pencils, biros and a note pad. An item of clothing which may be a t-shirt, hat, undies, socks, dress or shorts. A soft cuddle toy and several smaller toys to play with.



The girls get hair bands, hair ties, purse and jewellery. The boys may get a ball, car, marbles or puzzle. A book to read and maybe a colouring book. Extra clothing, books and toys are sent for the other children within the church who do not receive a bag. This is a very exciting project, being able to bring a smile to the faces of these under-privileged children who may never have had a toy of their own. Donations of new items always welcome.

Local Peace Poster Winner

Hannah Rudd, a grade 6 student at St James Primary School, has taken the first step to become an internationally recognized artist by winning a local competition sponsored by the Lions Club of Sebastopol & District. Hannah's poster was among more than 600,000 entries submitted worldwide in the annual Lions International Peace Poster Contest.

Lions International is sponsoring the program to emphasize the importance of world peace to young people everywhere. "My art represents no matter where you are in the world and what race you are, we can all be equal and peaceful. Together." the 12 year-old said. The poster was selected by three members of the Lions Club for its originality, artistic merit and portrayal of the contest theme, "Peace Without Limits". The judging was held on Friday 25th October at St James Primary School. Lions Club President Wayne Woodhouse said he was impressed by the expression and creativity of the students. "It is obvious that these young people have strong ideas about what peace means to them. I'm so proud that we were able to provide them with the opportunity to share their visions." Thanks also go to the 35 other students who participated.



Hannah's poster will advance through the district, multiple district and international levels of competition if she is to be declared the international grand prize winner Wayne said. One international grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners will be selected. The grand prize includes a cash award of \$5,000 and will be recognized at a special Lions International awards ceremony. The 23 merit award winners will each receive a certificate and a cash award of \$500. "Our club is cheering for Hannah as her poster advances in the competition, and we hope that her vision will ultimately be shared with others around the world," Wayne said.

Let's Stay Safe This Fire Season: A Message from the Sebastopol Fire Brigade

As the warmer months approach, we at the Sebastopol Fire Brigade want to remind everyone how important it is to prepare for the fire season. A little effort now can make a big difference in keeping your family, neighbours, and community safe.



Getting Ready for Fire Season

Taking some time to prepare your home and property can help reduce the risk of fire:

<u>Clean Up Around Your Home:</u> Make sure leaves, sticks, and other flammable materials are cleared from your gutters, garden beds, and yard. Keeping things tidy can help prevent fires from spreading.

<u>Plan Ahead:</u> Have a bushfire survival plan in place, and talk it through with your family. Know your evacuation routes and what you'll take if you need to leave quickly. Identify your trigger for evacuation. If you plan to leave, leave early.

<u>Stay in the Know:</u> Keep an eye on fire alerts and conditions. The Vic Emergency app and CFA website are great resources to stay informed. Learn and understand the Fire Danger Ratings and what they mean to you.

Help Us Get to You Faster

When emergencies happen, every second counts, and clear access to streets and hydrants is essential. Here's how you can help:

<u>Mind Your Parking:</u> Fire trucks are big! Please make sure there's enough space on your street for our appliances to get through quickly.

<u>Don't Block Hydrants:</u> Parking over or near hydrants slows us down when we need water fast. Make sure hydrants are clear and visible. Do you know what a hydrant looks like? Do you know the markers to look for? Adopt a hydrant and keep it clear for us to access.





Look Out for Each Other

<u>Check Your Surroundings:</u> If you notice something that could block emergency vehicles, like overgrown trees or a car parked awkwardly, see if you can fix it.

<u>Chat with Your Neighbours:</u> A quick conversation can go a long way. If you spot a problem, kindly bring it up. We all play a role in keeping Sebastopol safe.

Building garden a with community help



Urban Farming students at Ballarat Neighbourhood Centre have been building a trial vegetable garden at the Sebastopol Community Garden. The challenge has been to do it with a very limited budget. A site with plenty of sun was marked out, but the nearest tap was 40 metres away. Midland Irrigation in Delacombe helped solve the problem by generously donating equipment for a new garden tap. Students also visited the store to learn about the range of pipes and fittings. Bunnings at Delacombe kindly helped out with watering equipment, fertiliser and garden safety gear. A 'no dig' method was chosen for creating the garden beds in the ground. This involves laying down cardboard to smother the existing grass and weeds rather than spraying or tilling. Materials are then piled on top which break down into compost, including wood chips, straw, manure, lawn clippings and lake weed. Various local have donated organisations these materials the City of Ballarat, Alpine Management, and Giant Ballarat. Once the beds are complete, summer vegetables will be planted including tomatoes and green beans.

A big thanks goes out to all those in the community who have helped so far.

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Historically Speaking

Happy Birthday Redan Primary School!



On November 22, 2024 the Redan campus of Phoenix P - 12 Community College celebrated its 150th anniversary. The deadline for newsletter articles is before the actual celebrations so rather than report on the celebrations this article tries to give a short history of the school.

Free, secular and compulsory education for children aged 6 to 15 was made law in Victoria in 1872. Until then a number of church and other private schools had been operating. Redan State School opened on 2 Feb 1874 at two separate sites (former private schools leased by the new Education Department), one in Verdon Street and the other on the corner of Clarkson and Kent Streets. 359 children attended on the first day, and many more were turned away due to lack of space. Rooms at the Wesleyan Church in Rubicon Street were then hastily leased to accommodate the overflow and became the infants' classroom. Three weeks later 507 students were attending, spread over three or four sites.

In March 1874 tenders were invited for the erection of a brick building for a state school at Redan. Land was reserved for a state school at Redan and on March 2nd a tender for the building of the school was awarded to William Sealey at a cost of £3,025 5s. 9d. In January 1875 the new school building opened at current Hertford Street site and all students were now accommodated on one site. Due to an economic depression the Education Department suffered massive cutbacks and Redan State School was made an adjunct of the Sebastopol State School. From 1 May 1893 until 31 Dec 1909 only the infant classes were held at Redan. Older children had to attend Sebastopol State School.

In the following years when the most of the mines in the area had been closed down and the miners had moved on the school's enrolments fell and the north wing of the school was closed and was left unused for almost 50 years.

1920 saw the unveiling of the school's Honor Board by the Hon. Major Baird. The Honor Board commemorates the service of past students and staff in World War One. In 1921 the Redan Old Scholars Association was formed and held regular reunions at Easter each year for many decades. The association was very active and the Sebastopol Historical Society have many of their records. The jubilee gates donated by the Old Scholars for the school's 60th anniversary still mark the school's



entrance. School enrolments reached an all time low of just 99 students in 1947. There was a Head Teacher and 3 assistants on staff. Fortunately power was connected to the school in 1948 and in 1949 milk was provided to children who had lunch at school.

Having been out of use for half a century the north wing of the school was renovated in 1956 and two further classrooms were added. With the support of the Mother's Club, optional school uniforms were introduced in 1958. The uniform consisted of grey tunics, trousers and jumpers with the school colours of maroon and gold on the trim of school jumpers and ties. The 1960s saw the introduction of school crossings and attendants funded by parent contributions from Redan Primary School and Sebastopol Technical School. A timber building comprising of two classrooms and a staffroom was completed in 1963. The school oval opened in 1965 and the school house system was introduced. The houses were named for the surrounding streets, Alfred, Hertford, Kent and Vernon. The school canteen was built in 1967.

The growing suburb of Delacombe put pressure on enrolments at the school in the 1970s. Two neighbouring properties were purchased allowing for the upgrade of facilities for the growing Prep enrolments. Student numbers peaked at 522 in 1979. Numbers dropped to 372 students in 1981 after the opening of Delacombe Primary School.

In 1996 staff computers were connected to the Internet with students being given access to the world wide web in 1997. A new playground was installed in 1998 and the following year the school celebrated its 125th anniversary.

Redan Primary School merged with Sebastopol Secondary college to become Phoenix P-12 Community College and in 2013 after input from students, a new uniform with a black, purple and gold colour scheme was introduced.

Emotion Coaching

Are you struggling with your children's emotional wellbeing? Would you love to connect to your children more? Have you considered emotion coaching?

Emotion coaching is where we help our children work their way through their emotions, rather than dismissing them. For instance, maybe your child doesn't want to go to their friend's birthday party. Rather than dismissing their emotions as being irrational and telling them they are going, emotion coaching would be sitting down with your child and working through the reasons why they don't want to go to the party. During this process you will become more aware of your child's emotions, recognising your child's expression of emotion as a perfect moment for intimacy and teaching, listening with empathy and validating your child's feelings, helping your child learn to label their emotions with words



and set limits when you are helping your child to solve problems or deal with upsetting situations appropriately. As your child becomes a master of their emotions, being able to understand them and regulate them, they will become more self-confident, perform better in social and academic situations and even become physically healthier.


